Students must select two different concentrations (nine hours each) from the following: English choose from ENGL 3203, ENGL 3303, ENGL 3663, and ENGL 2013 or ENGL 2023 (cannot be course used to meet humanities requirement); mathematics MATH 3803 and MATH 3843, and either MATH 1453 or STAT 2503; science chose two lecture/lab combinations from GEOL 2653/GEOL 2651, BIOL 2203/BIOL 2201, and CHEM 1303/CHEM 1301, and one hour of elective; social studies EDUC 4203, and two of the following: GEOG 2763, HIST 1123 or HIST 1133, and HIST 2753 or HIST 2763.
- 6. Prior to graduation, students must demonstrate competency in financial literacy by satisfactory completion of FIN 1521 (or approved substitution) with a grade of C or better, or a score of 70% or more on a challenge exam for FIN 1521.
- 7. Students will select either the licensure or non-licensure track. Licensure track requires EDUC 4803 and EDUC 490A; Non-licensure track requires 12 hours of upper or lower level free electives.

Students must earn a C or higher in all courses on the degree plan. Students must maintain a 2.75 cumulative GPA or better. GPA is tracked throughout the program and verified for admission into internship.

Student Degree Program Requirements

By signing below it is understood that admission is by application to the Teacher Credential and Standards Committee (TCSC) of the Teacher Education Council (TEC). Applications are available from the School of Education. Once admitted, students must maintain satisfactory progress throughout the completion of the Educator Preparation Program according to the criteria cited above and any additional program standards in effect or lose eligibility to continue the program. A student's degree program requirements are those specified in the catalog in effect at the time of declaration of program major. If not on the Guaranteed 8-semester degree plan, students may choose to meet the program requirements specified in the catalog for a later year from when they began their program of study. Students must meet the above program requirements and the graduation requirements as indicated by institutional and college policy. The program can be changed only with the approval of the official advisor. If original courses are eliminated, students may be required to meet new curriculum requirements in the degree program. If students are not enrolled for two or more consecutive terms (excluding summer terms), they must re-enter under the program requirements of the current catalog. Students are responsible for understanding program requirements and changes. Guaranteed 8-semester Degree Completion Program Pursuant to Act 1014 of 2005, qualified first-time freshmen with a declared major may elect to participate in the guaranteed 8-semester degree completion program. Students must follow the above degree plan and meet all requirements as outlined in the Guaranteed 8-semester Degree Completion Program contract. The contract and this degree plan must be signed and filed with the advisor before the first day of classes for the student's first term of attendance.
